Who We Are

JIATF West is the U.S. Indo-Pacific Command's Executive Agent for the counter drug mission.

Our military's primary mission is to defend our nation, not to act or operate in a law enforcement capacity. Today, we are living in a world where the capabilities of drug cartels and large transnational criminal organizations rival those of many nation states. Defending against those threats stemming from the proliferation of drugs by powerful crime syndicates requires leveraging capabilities that are only available from within our military.

With the passing of the Military Cooperation with Civilian Law Enforcement Agencies Act in 1981, the U.S. Military began assisting law enforcement in performing counterdrug work.

By 1989, several Task Force units were created with the mission of assisting law enforcement in combating drug trafficking, including what is known today as Joint Interagency Task Force West (JIATF West), in Hawaii; JIATF South, in Florida; and Joint Task Force North, in Texas.



INTELLIGENCE ACTIVITIES B TARGETING

We provide intelligence support to U.S. Law Enforcement (LE) agencies, in collaboration with partner nation agencies, to support counter drug (CD) efforts. These capabilities include locating and tracking vessels, collection management, network analysis, precursor supply chain analysis, and support for treasury designations.



ENHANCING Partner Capacity

We facilitate small-scale infrastructure projects to enhance CD operations and training for partner nations in coordination with U.S. interagency partners. Examples of infrastructure projects include construction of police training centers, target ranges, patrol boat maintenance facilities and piers, check points, and command centers.



We facilitate training and subject matter expert exchanges with interagency partners for partner nations to increase collaboration and enhance LE capabilities. Examples of training include Maritime Skills, Mission Planning, Narcotics and Law Enforcement Investigations, Officer Boarding, Search and Seizure, Financial Investigative Techniques, Drug Abuse and Recognition, Intelligence Analysis, and Cybercrime Investigations.
